On August 9, 1974, Vice President Gerald R. Ford became the 38th President of the United States when President Richard Nixon resigned his office in disgrace because of the Watergate scandal.

Not long after taking over the reins of the country, President Ford issued a full legal pardon to Richard Nixon. Ford's pardon of Nixon was not a popular decision at the time, even among his own Republican party. Historians believe that this decision cost President Ford his bid for the presidency in 1976 when he lost a close election to Jimmy Carter.

Today, most historians and political observers agree that President Ford's tough decision to pardon Nixon was the right thing to do and was in the country's best interest. His leadership helped heal a nation and restore confidence in the office of the President of the United States.
